

Stephen Brathwaite – Different Perspectives

sculptor of ingenious and evocative forms? The heritage restoration redeveloper? The eclectic artistic accomplishments of Almonte's Stephen Brathwaite extend far beyond his **Connecting** adopted home town.

Let's start at the very beginning. Stephen was born in Ottawa South, the youngest child with two gifted and dauntingly artistic siblings. His brother John was owner of a successful kitchen design company, and, by the time she was 26, his sister Noreen Young was creating and operating puppets for *Hi Diddle Day*, a CBC series that aired until 1977. She was also creator and Executive Producer of *Under the Umbrella Tree*, a popular CBC Television children's series that ran from 1987 to 1997. Not feeling competitive, Stephen elected to study the Sociology of Deviance at Carleton University. His choice proved auspicious; he continues to apply his knowledge of patterns of human behaviour across his many artistic endeavours.

Puppet Misbehaviour

"Nepotism isn't necessarily a bad thing," Brathwaite jokes. While acquiring his Honours B.A. he was flying to Toronto on weekends to earn extra money as a puppeteer on his precocious sister's TV show. Under Noreen's tutelage, Stephen had become an accomplished puppeteer as early as 1969, working with her puppets on Hi Diddle Day. For me, an unexpected highlight of our interview was watching a YouTube episode of *The Bride of Chucky* as Brathwaite explained how he worked with a team of ten people in 1998 to animate Chucky and his puppet bride. Stephen operated Chucky's right arm; the two puppets' lips were controlled by software.

Multifaceted

After graduation he spent a year working as a psychometrist administering tests. That spurred him to combine his arts interests with his academic background and he earned a Master's in Environmental Studies at York University. Anticipating a career in arts administration, he concentrated on Art Communication and Community Development in the Arts.

Almost inadvertently he acquired the accoutrements of a professional glass studio with a fellow arts student, and found that more and more often he was heading back to the studio to create his own art. By 1984 Stephen participated in the (juried) First International Architectural Stained Glass Design Seminar in Germany with internationally recognized


Which artist should I write about first? The glass painter Jochem Poensgen. In 1985 he won a irreverently funny puppeteer? The creator of scholarship to attend a design seminar with glass inclusive thought-provoking public art? The artists Joachim Klos and Lutz Haufschild. The latter is an internationally recognized glass artist known for his thoughtful integration of art and architecture.

Stephen Brathwaite's public art and heritage redevelopment projects epitomize that profound understanding. "It's organized playing," he explains. "Art offers so many opportunities for self expression and creating a direct connection to a community."

That is what he is known for. Collaboration is his hallmark — with clients, with models, with other artists and especially with communities. He seldom exhibits his works, preferring to interact with people and to develop relationships that are site- and clientspecific. He has cast fibreglass molds of neighbours and their kids for his public pieces. He has worked locally with artists Dale Dunning and Robert Pauly, and created the "North is Freedom" sculpture for the city of Halifax with Nova Scotia sculptor Doug Bamford. In typical Brathwaite fashion, the piece includes stories and bits of text referencing the history and culture of the neighbourhood. Even Mrs. Johnson's recipe for black-eyed peas and rice is included.



To lighten the tone at the North Bay Courthouse he created "In the Balance" as a visual pun. The piece features life-size acrobats performing on a tightrope, suggesting that justice hangs in the balance in the courtroom. His "Strathcona Folly" is an imaginative work of "playable art" for kids at Strathcona Park in Ottawa. Essentially a large sand box, the structure was inspired



by the floor plans of Victorian mansions that were built in the neighbourhood, and constructed with actual found stone pieces of local architectural history. Once again, Brathwaite demonstrates his highly inventive ability to engage the viewer, indeed, the entire community, through intrigue. His works are accessible, but puzzling. He draws you in but doesn't fill in all the pieces; he invites you to engage — to figure them out for yourself.

Glass remains a favourite medium, and he has created windows for churches and for private entrances. For the latter, he incorporates images and texts that hold particular meaning for the owners.

Community Collaboration

With the support of many partners and investors, Brathwaite's heritage redevelopment initiatives continue to play a major role in the economic development of his adopted home town of Almonte. Capitalizing on its scenic location along the banks of the Mississippi River, Brathwaite has helped change the face of the town.

In 1993 he and partner Greg Smith purchased Almonte's historical and dilapidated Victoria Woollen Mill, launching an ongoing series of heritage redevelopment projects that have revitalized the town. His next project, with partner Joh Hill, resulted in the creation of beautifully designed spaces for galleries, shops, studios, offices and residences in Thoburn Mill. The former textile mill now houses 23 apartment residences and small businesses. As a powerful testament to the wisdom of Lutz Haufschild's philosophy, today the corridors of the building serve as an ever-changing art gallery, featuring the works of local artists and attracting tourists and residents.

The latest Brathwaite initiative is the recently launched project known as 65 Mill St. The restoration of the delightful second-floor gingerbread balcony is just the frosting on the façade of another major reclamation of prime real estate at the heart of the downtown business and arts area.

Brathwaite is quick to note that many others have "...shared a vision in rebuilding in a way that shows great respect for heritage." In addition to business partners Greg Smith, Joh Hill, Marc Lefebvre and Bob McKay, he credits architects Peter Mansfield and Richard White, as well as trades people and many others for contributing in all kinds of ways. Ornamental Grasses

Happy New Year to all gardeners and garden lovers. Yes, it is winter, but the Perth and District Horticultural Society gives you the opportunity to dream now of the growing season to come. Tim feels ornamental grasses are one of the most underutilized options for garden planting. Owner and operator of Carp Garden Services, Tim is a professional horticulturist with extensive experience in the propagation of trees, perennials and shrubs, as well as pruning, garden design, and all other areas of horticulture. 

Two Years Later: Syrian Families in Almonte

Jarous and Mustafa families.

Of their first two years in Almonte, Radwan Mustafa jokes: "Two years? Feels like two days!" Then he turns serious. "These two years have been great: meeting new people, learning a new way of life."

The learning started with language. The four children attended local schools and quickly became conversant in English; Amjad Jarous (now 11 years old) won an English composition award in just his first year. Meanwhile, the four adults — Radwan and his wife Amal Damara, and Khedr Jarous and his wife Nour al-Tarsha — attended morning English lessons taught by local volunteers (many have since become friends to the families) and discovered that children learn a foreign language much more quickly.

Both Radwan and Khedr, however, were eager to become self-sufficient. The men set up home-based businesses, which brought further learning: about Canadian business practices, income tax, accounting, where to purchase supplies, how and where to market their services (upholstery) or goods (food). Their sponsorship groups helped in the business set-up, and several members continue to volunteer with accounting, marketing and client liaison.

Local media gave a generous and much-needed boost to enhancing public awareness of the two businesses. A September 17, 2016 article about Radwan Mustafa Upholstery even became The Millstone's



More than 25,000 Syrian refugees arrived in Canada most-accessed article to date. Radwan still receives during the frigid winter of 2015/6, including the clients as a result of that article and last year's advertising in the Humm. His clients' addresses reflect the media readership area; they have come from as far as Deep River, Chelsea (Quebec), Perth and Ottawa.

> CBC Radio One broadcast "In Town and Out" from Almonte in November 2016, and Nour was able to promote their business — Jessica's Syrian Food. Jessica's is a catering company, named for their daughter, that also operated from the Almonte Farmers' Market and, last summer, from the Carp Farmers' Market. Their catering jobs, for 8–200 people, also come from around the Ottawa Valley.

> Amid all the business and navigating a new culture ("don't point with your middle finger"), the best news arrived at the Almonte General Hospital. Baby Jenna was born to Amal in January 2016, and five weeks later, Goldana joined the Jarous family.

> Both families agree the first two years have gone by very quickly. Like many Canadians, they feel that winter is the worst thing about living here, but they're thankful: for their sponsorship groups, for being in Almonte and for the friends they've made.

> The Syrian conflict robbed them of their future in that country, but they're hopeful for a good one

> "Our plan for the future is striving for a better state of living," says Radwan. To achieve that, Radwan wants to build his business, through formal and word-of-mouth advertising, and adds, "my work is

> Radwan works efficiently from a small room in his house but looks forward to having a larger, ventilated work shop one day. Such a shop will allow him to take on re-upholstery jobs that entail gluing or sanding repairs. In the meantime, he does meticulous, clean work and loves tackling antiques.

Khedr and Nour are also looking to the future. They will be opening a small restaurant in Carleton Place sometime in February. Khedr has been cleaning and outfitting a former pizza joint on Bridge Street and at press time was arranging signing, licensing

Despite all the favourable moments in their lives, the families endure a constant pressure that few of us know. Their parents, siblings and friends remain in war-torn Syria. Sporadic electricity in that country can mean no news for days, and it's easy enough to imagine the worse.

But even in this there is light. Khedr's sister, Alset, her husband and two children arrived in Almonte from Jordan in December, and Radwan and Amal expect family to join them soon.

Eat Local Support a CSA!

Do the grey winter days have you dreaming about the greens of spring and summer? Why not ensure a steady supply of those greens (as well as lots of other delicious produce) by investing in a local CSA?

CSA stands for Community Shared Agriculture (also known as Community Supported Agriculture), which is essentially a partnership between growers and eaters. By purchasing a CSA "share", eaters enter an agreement with farmers who then supply them with a season's worth of vegetables — with a full share usually feeding a family of four. Typically, some or all of the cost of the subscription is paid up front, which helps the farmer with financing for the year. It also provides a secure market, allowing farmers to do what they do best — grow nutritious, great-tasting food. In Lanark County, many farms (such as the ones listed on this page) begin selling CSA shares as early as January, so contact them early to reserve your spot!

The Benefits

One of the advantages of participating in a CSA is that you get to deal directly with the farmer who grew the food. You can ask questions about the growing conditions or find out how to best prepare an unfamiliar vegetable. Knowing what kind of produce you'll be getting in a given week enables you to plan meals, which is a great way to reduce both wasted food and extra trips to the grocery store.

Supporting small-scale, local farms means voting with your dollars for the option that is easier on the planet than large, monocrop industrial farms. You will also feel like you're doing something good for your health and the health of your family. Local growers are proud of what they sell, and their primary goal is to produce vegetables, fruit and meat that taste great and are full of nutrients. You will be dealing with a local expert, someone who spends a good deal of time on the many tasks related to turning soil, sunlight and water into delicious food. The farmers then sustain the local economy by making local purchases, resulting in a win-win situation!

Most CSAs sell out well before Spring, so call now to book your share!

tools until you can shave with them? Haunting the garden aisles of local hardware stores?

Take heart, there is a support group; a place where you can meet like-minded souls whose green thumbs are itching for action. I am referring of course to Seedy Saturdays (and **Sundays).** These grass-roots events are locally organized — the Canadian not-for-profit organization Seeds of Diversity has a loose organizational role, providing some guidance and some publicity. They are a series of separate events that have sprung

up across the country; each individually organized under the themes of encouraging the use of open-pollinated and heritage seeds, enabling a local seed exchange, and educating the public about seed saving and environmentally responsible gardening practices.

These events are very timely for the serious gardener who is venturing into starting their own seedlings under lights. While the time to start some varieties indoors under lights is rapidly approaching, it is important to take a deep breath and slow down. Tomatoes should not be started until mid-March — otherwise they will become hopelessly lanky and out of control — you will not produce robust seedlings that are worthy of gracing your veggie patch. Peppers and eggplants can be started a couple of weeks earlier. But there are a number of other vegetables that respond very well to a much longer growing period under lights veggies that I have very successfully started in February include parsley, onions, leeks, celery, celeriac, globe artichoke and cardoon. So now is a great time to get out and talk to experienced gardeners and check out the huge diversity of vegetable varieties that are available.

Seedy Saturday in Almonte...

The seedy season kicks off in Almonte! Seedy Saturday comes to the Civitan Club (500 Almonte Road) on February 10 from 9AM to 3PM. Johvi Leeck, a young local entrepreneur and owner (along with a bit of help from mom and dad) of the gardening venture "Beyond the Garden Gate", is organizing this event for a third year. The inaugural year of 2016 was a tremendous success, and Johvi continues to build on it.

There will be many vendors of heritage seeds, a seed exchange table, and presentations on gardening. And of course all of our local gardening groups will be well represented — the Neighbourhood Tomato Community Gardening Program, the Almonte & District Horticultural Society, the Canadian Organic Growers, the Seed Library at the Almonte Library, Seeds of Diversity and the Lanark County Master Gardeners are all enthusiastic supporters of Seedy Saturday. For me, one of the most important aspects is the opportunity for networking with many gardening groups to learn of their latest accomplishments and their plans for 2018.

Gardeners will be able to exchange information (and of course to commiserate about the wild challenges of gardening in 2017) and to buy, sell or trade interesting and unusual heritage varieties of vegetable, fruit, herb, flower, wild and native Ontario seeds. There will be an

Sharpening garden can be taken home. Many gardening and environmental organizations will have information tables. Speakers throughout the day will discuss a range of topics of interest for beginners through to advanced gardeners.

> For many years I attended and spoke at the larger Seedy Saturday event at Britannia Park in Ottawa. But eventually this overwhelmingly successful gardening event became too successful for my tastes! Before the doors opened there was a line-up of people and by afternoon it was so crowded that it was almost impossible to move. So I was delighted when Seedy Saturday came to Almonte. This is another amazingly successful Almonte event and a terrific opportunity for gardeners from the area to network, for local producers to showcase their wares, and for learning. It's also a great way to support local small businesses these folks are not in it for the big bucks, but rather because they believe fervently in what they are doing.

Some Seedy Saturdays are hosted by established institutions; others by the voluntary effort of a few individuals in community centres or church basements. The events are relatively informal, have a low cost of entry for visitors and vendors, and a general theme that attracts growers of heritage seeds, organic practitioners, native plant growers and environmental groups. This is aligned with Seeds of Diversity's interests — that organization has come to be viewed as a natural participant and promoter of these events. Seedy Saturdays' grass-roots nature — low overhead, low admission, local talent, and volunteer energy — distinguishes them from expensive, commercially driven garden shows. Attendees are able to contribute, not just consume.

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A Prescription for the February Blues

Folkus presents Sussex with Ali McCormick

There are nights where nothing will do but the blues. And most of them are in February.

On Saturday, February 24, Folkus has the cure for what ails you — a little blues, a little jazz, a little mojo je-ne-sais quoi. We're prescribing Sussex <sussexvibrafolk.com>, a band put together by Montreal bluesman Rob Lutes (two Maple Blues award nominations this year!) and his childhood buddy, vibraphonist Michael Emmenau. Rob and Michael played together twenty-five or so years ago as high school students in New Brunswick, and began collaborating again in Montreal around 2011.

Their songs reflect influences from Tin Pan Alley, from blues and folk history, and from the gypsy jazz of Django Reinhardt. But where Reinhardt's guitar worked with the delicate strings of Stéphane Grapelli, Lutes' guitar has a foil in Emmenau's airy vibraphone. It sounds unlikely, but it really works. They round out the sound with flugelhorn, stand-up bass and violin, with vocal contributions from the gravel-voiced Lutes.

Parade Day, the first Sussex album, includes five songs written by Rob, one by Michael, and five cowritten songs. It also includes a delightful cover of Randy Newman's *Dayton, Ohio – 1903*.

The Lioness of Lanark, Ali McCormick, will be opening for Sussex. She grew up in Lanark County, and has been singing ever since she can remember. McCormick has been honing her skills the last few years with a lot of hard touring — and it shows. Her stage presence, songwriting and singing have become so strong. We are really pleased to welcome Ali to our stage.

As always, Folkus shows happen at the Almonte Old Town Hall, in the fabulous Ron Caron Auditorium. Doors open at 7:30pm and seating is first-come, first-served. Volunteer with SchoolBox to Make Education Possible!







February — a wonderful time of the vegetable garden, plotting out their yards to on this beautiful planet gets plant the landscape. By planting native plants designed for local wildlife, we increase our own survival by contributing to the natural landscape and supporting the other animals that we live with. At my home, we planted a natural meadow of native wild grasses and wildflowers two years ago, and we're still amazed at the enjoyment we get seeing all the animals taking advantage of these plants.

The planet Earth is one magnificent creation, that much we know. While there is still debate as to how the Earth came to be and how we as humans came to inhabit it, there is no denying its absolute beauty and wonderment.

As humans, we can often get swept covered in a blanket of snow in the nest is away in day-to-day life and forget how truly amazing it is that we live in such a diverse ecosystem. As we evolve and learn more about how our planet works, more of us are becoming mindful of the health of the planet and each of the organisms that call it home.

As defined by the Merriam-Webster dictionary, an ecosystem is "the complex of a community of organisms and its environment functioning as an ecological unit". As stewards of this great planet, we need to remember this fact.

While there are issues facing us today that are certainly global or political in nature, much of the necessary change does lie in the power of our own two hands. It starts right in our own communities and backyards. Break it down far enough, and it is not hard to understand that every animal

its food from plants — either directly or as a by-product.

The Importance of Insects

We've changed as a society, and that is not always a bad thing. That said, over the course of the last few decades, we have grown increasingly hostile towards insects and have severely affected their populations.

While some folks might get a good case of the "heebie jeebies" when encountering certain insects, we must not forget their importance to this cycle we call life.

According to Doug Tallamy, Professor and Chair of the Department of Entomology at the University of Delaware, "The most important group of animals that take energy from plants and pass it to other animals are the insects that eat plants."

Creating Meadows & Wildlife Gardens The key to this part of the equation is using native species. When we plant something in our yard, we must consider the native qualities of that plant or flower. The herbivorous insects have adapted to them, and therefore have developed the physiological ability to digest them.

When we create gardens containing nonnative plants and flowers, it interrupts the vital cycle needed to keep balance within

our delicate ecosystem. When designing a wildflower patch or garden in your yard, be sure to keep these factors in mind and you are bound to enjoy the benefits that come with a healthy ecosystem and an aesthetically pleasing landscape.

The Emerald Ash Borer has reached that "critical mass" in our neck of the woods now! Unlike DED, there will be no survivors, not even young trees in the short-term. EAB kills every type of Ash tree (*Fraxinus*). What will happen when every Ash is dead? Will the pest die off? What if they try our beloved Maples and find the tasty sap to their liking? We have no idea!

That's the big difference between these two pests: the disease (DED) leaves some short-term survivors, but the insect (EAB) is fatal to all its victims.

Tree-mendous as our efforts have been, Mother Nature (who already has a reputation for such things) has thrust a stick into our collective spokes. But there's no sense just Pining over the facts as we Cedar right in front of our faces. Let me Spruce this missive up by sandwiching the hard facts between another positive message.

Yew can be part of the solution. Plant a tree or three!

The net proceeds from this community project go to the Hub Hospice Palliative Care coffers, so you will be supporting a good cause as you "treevitalize" the local environment. I for one plan to spend part of my summer under a Beech rather than just at one!


New Music by Local Duo

phones, and listen! No gum, no ball caps, NO **SLOUCHING!!**

This is it, kids: a grammar lesson! I'm appalled at the insouciance of writers and speakers who are ignoring the most basic of grammatical structures. It is little wonder students are unable to express themselves clearly when they are ignorant of the very constructs that make our language work. Again today, I ground my teeth when I read: "He made me lay down". Now, I'm here to tell

you there has never been a person, nor a dog for that matter, that can "lay down". Down is shed from birds, and unless some supernatural event is occurring, no creature can produce *down* in the same manner as a chicken can produce an egg. Do you get it? A chicken can lay an egg; a dog cannot lay down!

"But everyone says that". Well, they shouldn't. It's just plain wrong, and here's why. The word *lay* is a transitive verb. (There are lots of these babies, but we're just working on this one for now. No use overloading the brain.) Transitive means that there is an action conveyed from that verb to something else, namely an object. Thus, you can lay a book down, you can lay your cards down, but you can't simply lay down, since *down* is only an object when it is coming off ducks. Should I tell you that *down* can be an adverb? La la la, too much information.

Some of you may know the little prayer, "Now I lay me down to sleep." That's a perfect example to keep in your pocket. See how the word *lay* is followed

Sit down, turn off your infernal not-so-smart There used to be a song called Lay, Lady Lay. Not possible unless Lady is a chicken! I know, "Lie, Lady Lie" wouldn't' have worked, but let's call that poetic licence. Sometimes grammar is superseded by art.

> So what are you going to tell your dog now? You're going to stand in front of the dog and in proper grammatical English say sternly: "Lie down". Watch his little face brighten and watch his bum hit the ground, all because you spoke to him correctly. Don't confuse the dog by expecting him to perform an unnatural act!

> Grammar Lesson Part Two: the poor little apostrophe. It's a useful little mark, but not one to abuse. Use the apostrophe to replace omitted letters, as in this example called The Refrain of Regret: "Should've, could've, didn't". Use the apostrophe to show possession, as in "Mary's Lament". There are other places for it too, but for now, that's enough.

> For goodness sakes, do not abuse the apostrophe. It's better to err on the side of omission than pop it in willy-nilly. A sign on our main street declared "Open Sunday's". I stood there thinking maybe they meant "Open Sunday's gift", "Open Sunday's letter", but no, what they meant was "Open on a few Sundays", plain old plural, not in need of the apostrophe at all. A simple "s" on the end of a word will be sufficient to convey the meaning. The sign could have read "Sundays, Mondays, and Tuesdays", and we'd have gone on our merry way so much the wiser.

"Is this yours"? There's no need for the apostrophe here either. Think of this: mine, hers his, yours. Now, think of this one: "its". Is the apostrophe in or out? When dealing with this little word, the rule is: if you're leaving out letters, you use the apostrophe; if you're not, you don't. If the "i-t-s" stands for "it is", pop in the apostrophe: "it's not rocket science"; if the "i-t-s" indicates possesby me? That's the transitive verb at work right there! sion, leave it out: "Its head was screwed on backwards".

Grammar Lesson Part Three: the split infinitive. English defies explanation at times. Our infinitive verb form demands two words: "to" plus the verb. These must be kept together like lovers' hands in one mitt. Every day we see things like: "I try to not think of politics". That should have been "I try *not* to think of politics". The verb is "to think", and that's what you have to do every time you get carried away and force some word into the infinitive couple. It's not acceptable! The extra word needs to be before or after the infinitive, but never smack in the middle. Read any newspaper and you can red-pencil this construct many times.

Wait a minute... I didn't say you could leave yet! Yes, it's going to be on the exam... No, I won't be allowing cheat sheets! Get out of here; you'll be late for your next class.

The Road Less Travelled...


There was never any doubt in my mind. My ultimate goal in life was to be a mystery writer. After taking an early retirement from a management career path that spanned more than two decades, I set out to make my dream come true.


I took creative writing courses, joined writing groups, and attended writers' conferences. To gain credibility as a writer, I wrote articles for a community newspaper and submitted short crime stories to online and print publications. I was thrilled when they were accepted. I was now a published writer! The next step in my career was to find a literary agent that would represent me. Out went the letters to my chosen list of agents and I waited. Since the competition was fierce, I didn't raise my hopes too high.

Though most agents expressed positive feedback in their replies, none offered to represent me. But I didn't give up so easily. I sent out another batch of requests, then another. I received the same response. My mystery novel wasn't *exactly* what the traditional publishers were looking for at this time. I was discouraged, but as they say, when a door closes, another one opens. And it did.

It was 2012. I stood at the threshold of a new surge in independent publishing. Recording artists and filmmakers had already gained success under independent labels, so the extension into book publishing was a logical move. Retail giants like Amazon offered writers a range of services that included direct publishing in e-book and paperback formats and international distribution. Toronto-based Kobo offered similar services with comparable book royalties. There was hope!

I explored this opportunity with newfound enthusiasm. Through social media, I connected with a network of successful independent writers—or *Indies*. A motivated and confident group, they were happy to share their publishing and marketing experience and pay it forward. The advantages? My book wouldn't have to be shopped around by an agent and go through lengthy committee approval. I'd retain complete creative control over book content and

design. I'd have to handle my own marketing, but most traditional authors had to promote their books months after the initial launch too.

I did more research. Some self-published writers had become so successful that they'd quit their day jobs. Even traditionally published authors had blurred the lines and were self-publishing their new books. I gave the premise serious thought. Should I or shouldn't I? The way I saw it, a self-published writer was no different from any other small business owner who worked to ensure their personally crafted goods met high standards.

Vowing not to compromise quality for speed, I took the leap. I hired a website designer and chose professional editors, proofreaders, book cover designers and distributors. I established author pages on retailer book sites and on social media, notably Facebook and Twitter. Promotion took up a fair share of my time and still does, but it's an essential tool in increasing the chances of one's "discoverability" in today's competitive global market.

By the time I'd published my third mystery novel, I was holding several booksigning events a year. I was excited to meet readers in person and eager to chat with them about their reading habits and preferences. I especially valued their feedback about the types of mysteries and literary characters they enjoyed.

Do I have any regrets about taking this road to publishing? Not in the least. My days are busy but I love every moment. Knowing that readers enjoy my stories is the reason I'll continue to write the best books I possibly can. With only five mystery novels to my name so far, the road ahead is limitless!
