



Catherine Orfald — A Fine Balance

studio. Both offer tranquil views of pastoral Brooke Valley in Maberly. Catherine Orfald's oil on canvas paintings are inspired by the natural environment that sustains her. Her compositions feature landscapes and portraits of the people, flora and fauna that share this amazing planet with her.

She favours a subdued colour palette, drawing attention to the natural beauty of her subjects. She prefers subtle to vivid, creating canvases that soothe and replenish rather than stimulate and excite. She paints slowly, savouring every aspect of the process. Her preferred medium has always been oil paints. Slow-drying oils encourage, in fact, demand, contemplative creation.

Orfald's love of animals shines through her portraits of pets. Her website at <orfald.ca> is replete with testimonials from the delighted recipients of her commissioned works — "Catherine's painting (of black Newfoundland dogs) captured the heart and souls of the pair..." Clients share equally enthusiastic praise for portraits of children and other loved ones. She also does landscape commissions, including one for a client in Texas who wanted a memento for his children of the view they grew up with in St. Catherine's. She works from client's photos as well as from life, and from her own photos as well as en plein air.



A Circuitous Journey

Catherine was twelve when her family moved from Minneapolis, Minnesota, to Belleville where her father had found employment as a social worker at Children's Aid. Her grandfather was a commercial photographer and a fine artist, and her family encour-

Upstairs is the office, down the hill is the art school art teacher purchased one of her paintings, it validated her decision to enroll in fine arts education at Algonquin College in Ottawa, concentrating on oil painting and portraiture. Her artwork has appeared in solo and group exhibitions in Canada and Mexico since the '90s.

> Her husband, Steev Morgan, is also an artist and has been her partner and her artistic collaborator throughout her journey. Steev is now the principal of Brooke Media Arts, providing web hosting and multi-media services. In the early '80s the couple moved to Toronto where Steev continued his education at the Photo/Electric Arts Department at OCA twenty years in Toronto as an exciting and enjoyable chapter in their creative lives.

After working primarily in oils, Catherine took a hiatus from turpentine fumes when she became pregnant with their first son. For an artist-in-residence project at Fringe Research Laboratory, she conceptualized a holographic piece entitled *Mother* of Songs. Executed as a triptych, the piece comprises three reflection holograms — images of mother, father and baby — celebrating creation and family. The piece originally appeared in *Hololocalization* at Interference Hologram Gallery in Toronto, and then as an autARKy installation in A Life of Its Own at El Centro Nacional de las Artes in Mexico City.

The Road Not Taken (until later)

Rejecting Robert Frost's binary dilemma, Orfald has managed to conflate two career paths plus a variety of volunteer activities. She is intellectually curious and brings both discipline and spontaneity to her endeavours. At every turn employers and organizations have noted her organizational skills, work ethic and ability to master new technologies and concepts quickly.

An early job at Inter/Access Media Art Centre in Toronto exposed her to explorative media. (Years later the non-profit gallery, educational facility and production studio remains "dedicated to emerging practices in art and technology.") That opportunity got her in on the ground floor of the fast-paced world of computers and their burgeoning application to art and education, and changed the course of her life. She became the Centre's workshop coordinator and then started teaching art workshops and computer graphics skills. Building on that experience, she joined the International Academy of Design and Technology where she was promoted to Chair of Computer Graphics and then Dean of Students. When the owners opened another school in Ottawa, she and Steev decided to move to Ottawa so she could accept an offer to be the Director of Education



Eventually the couple started looking for a place in the country. (Ontario College of Art). Catherine remembers their In 2004 they became the delighted owners of their current home on Old Brooke Road, and Catherine spent the rest of the year commuting to Ottawa. It was time to re-invent herself again. In 2005 she took a position at dominKnow in Perth and began her career as an instructional designer, developing custom courseware for online learning and self-directed learning. (dominKnow is now based in Kanata, and has become a software company specializing in eLearning authoring tools and software for teams and large organizations.)

Another Branch in the Path

She struggled to find time to paint, so she considered her options. Catherine has over twelve years' experience as an e-learning instructional designer, course developer and technical writer. She has written curriculum for and taught computer graphics and design courses at the Ontario College of Art and Design and the International Academy of Design & Technology, and developed and taught art courses and workshops for children. In 2013 she took the plunge and started her own company, conex design, offering eLearning and m(obile)Learning courseware and video tutorials.

Freelance work affords her more flexibility to pursue her other passions — her painting, her community involvements and her volunteer work. Sometimes she is able to combine all three, as in the e/m/learning video she developed for volunteers at the Lanark County Therapeutic Riding Program. One can learn a lot about horses and FMS (Fundamental Movement Skills) at <conexdesign.com/samples>.

Another volunteer activity contributes to her enjoyment of nature. Each spring she participates in a marsh monitoring program that involves learning the calls of amphibians and reporting on their status. Most days she walks her two dogs to the marsh to join them in the celebration of their rich outdoor environment.

Perth Autumn Studio Tour

In 2006 Catherine Orfald was accepted as a participant in the annual Thanksgiving Weekend Perth Autumn Studio Tour. Since then she has served as director of marketing and is now serving another term as treasurer. This year, on October 6, 7 and 8 she is hosting four other artists at her studio at 1848 Old Brooke Rd. As many regular readers of the Humm are eagerly aware, this is one of the area's most rewarding studio tours, featuring over thirty artists spread across a marvelous fall landscape. Almonte in Concert Names the Steinway!


At their first concert of the 2018-19 season, the Almonte in Concert Steinway concert grand piano will be officially named after Jamie Parker, who selected the instrument for AIC back in November of 2002. The organization is thrilled to have Jamie Parker perform at the concert on October 20, and they encourage everyone to join them for this very special occasion.

In 2001 the AIC Board began the task of fundraising in order the purchase a new piano, and was able to raise the \$92,000 that was required — not a small feat for the volunteer-driven organisation.

On November 1, 2002, three Board members visited the Steinway factory in Queens, New York City, accompanied by Jamie Parker and his colleague, composer William Hirtz. After a fascinating tour of the factory, many hours were spent playing different pianos. In arriving at the final selection, Jamie felt that the chosen piano provided the best balance in all ranges and he liked its "touch". It was an interesting process for all involved — an experience not to be forgotten.

Time has shown that Jamie did indeed make a wonderful choice for AIC. So many musicians have commentated on the quality of the sound and how they love playing it. Over the years the piano has become an important part of the community, being used for other concerts, events and recordings.

On Saturday, October 20, join Jamie Parker, pianist and veteran of the concert stage, as he pairs up with two of Canada's most promising classical musicians of the new generation. This concert of solo and ensemble works will showcase the amazing virtuosity and artistry of supremely talented young musicians who are able to perform at outstanding technical and musical levels. The show begins at 7:30PM in the Almonte Old Town Hall.

Fluid Coffee: A Bit of **Sunshine in Every Cup**

If you sort through the thicket of election signs planted at every intersection, you will discover a sign for the Crown and Pumpkin Studio Tour that is held over the three days of the Thanksgiving weekend. It also happens to be Fluid Solar Roasted Coffee's annual open house and Stop #4 of the tour.

"Fluid Coffee is located on our family farm that was settled by the Thompsons in 1843. The farm is 175 years old this year," explains Lorraine Kemp (Thompson), who is the main coffee roaster for the company. "My husband Bill and I built our homestead off the electrical grid 25 years ago. We enjoy our close integration with nature and the wildlife that comes with it".

After a "first lifetime" working in high technology and renewable energy, the couple turned their hobby of roasting high-quality and exotic coffees into a craft business located on their property. Wanting to extend their commitment to the environment, the company also uses solar and wind to power the operation. Lorraine explains that the large solar-electric system shown in the photo provides the power for the business. "It takes eleven minutes of sunlight falling on our solar-electric panels to generate the electricity required to roast eight pounds of our luscious coffee. The panels also charge our electric coffee delivery vehicle, which will also be on display."

system that gently roasts the coffee beans using a hot-air process, not unlike an air popcorn maker," she adds. "The result is a coffee with a deep, smooth flavour and lovely aftertaste."

Humm readers are invited to drop by Fluid Coffee during their open house to tour the coffee roastery and sample the large selection of coffees at the fast, as well as lunch until 5PM. The couple has 17 tasting bar. The Open House is set mainly outside years' experience in fine dining restaurants, and and runs rain or shine, so be sure to dress for the many years of baking experience. They combine this fall weather.

Along with the coffee roastery, solar energy and electric car tours, there will be a children's table to keep the little ones entertained. Of course, you can also say "Hi" to the horses and Jessie the donkey, and if you are lucky the wild turkeys will also stop in.

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Face To Face with Séan McCann

Former Great Big Sea Member Tours Ontario

Séan McCann, acclaimed singer-songwriter, Devices can be divisive and the seductive JUNO Award nominee, and mental health screens we all now spend so much of our formats, your latest album There's and recovery advocate, is taking his music time with are actually pulling us apart. I and his message "Face to Face" through Ontario this fall. As a founding member of internationally renowned folk group Great Big Sea, Séan chose to forge his own path five years ago, embarking on a solo career that has brought him on a new journey with music as his medicine.

Séan's musical message is now more than just notes and melodies. His last two solo albums, Help Your Self and You Know I Love You, were a significant musical departure from his Great Big Sea beginnings, but in his latest release *There's a Place* he brings together his roots and his message on beautifully crafted tracks sung by a man who knows his purpose, who embraces his past, but refuses to let it define him.

In advance of his two upcoming shows in the area, the Humm got (virtually) face of music and we are made of love. to face with Séan to discuss the uniquely intimate tour that he is currently on.

Your latest tour is called Face to Face and is billed as "an opportunity to create real connection in a digital world." Why do you think it's so important right now to focus on this issue?

Addiction can be simply defined as behavior we cannot control. I believe that digital addiction is systemic in society and is having a negative impact on our collective psyche. Social media's promise of connection has proven to be superficial and false.

believe that gathering together as a community face to face can help counteract the screen-induced isolation of our digital age.

You are very open about being in recovery, and about the role that music has played in that process. What is it about music specifically that has helped you, and that might be able to help others?

Music has been my medicine; my therapy. I lost a lot of "friends" when I sobered up and I felt very isolated and vulnerable. People drink and use drugs for reasons, and the secrets of my own past began to come back and haunt me. Music gave me a healthy way to deal with my own history. Instead of numbing my pain, I was able to do the hard work and help myself. We are made of more than blood and bones. We are made

It sounds like you haven't crafted a typical "singer-songwriter plays music for passive audience" show for this tour. How has the different format been received so far?

Songs are most powerful when they are sung together, and my measure of a successful show is how many voices I can inspire to sing. I may be one man with a guitar, but I am never alone when I'm on stage. Over the past few years I have learned to be honest in front of people. I am not afraid to let my shows take on a life of their own.

Speaking of non-traditional a Place comes with a companion colouring book that you worked on with artist/designer Jenna Gregory. Can you tell us a bit about the album and the rationale behind including the book?

It was actually my son's idea. He's a big crayon fan and enjoys colouring while listening to my old records in front of the fireplace. He says it helps him relax and hear the music better. As a parent I am happy to see him embrace an activity off screen. As an artist, I like the idea of letting people participate in my artistic process. My favourite colour is green.


As someone who has played arenas and stadiums in the past, what makes smaller halls (such as the ABC Hall and the Almonte Old Town Hall) special to you, particularly for a tour like this one?

Large venues generate more cash but they force artists to dumb it down and simplify our messages. It's impossible to have a real conversation with thousands of people at the same time and I always found it very difficult to connect on a meaningful level. By bringing the walls closer and abandoning the ubiquitous jumbotron, I can now have a more intense and longer lasting impact on people's lives. These venues may be small but they are MIGHTY.

Line Dufour's recent work integrates new technologies such as smart textiles, fibre optics and other non-traditional materials. Her recent work, Re-Collection, is a multi-sensory installation of Jacquard woven shrouds inspired by Renaissance patterns. Each shroud depicts the face of a child or young woman killed by a sexual predator in Ontario. Historically perceived as a valuable weave, Dufour uses jacquard to honour the victims and their families. The weft is a UV-activated

thread that changes colour when exposed to UV rays, from white to a flesh tone — essentially "reanimating" the spirit and presence of the victims. *Re-Collection* has been exhibited in Toronto, Montreal and Vancouver in Canada, in Denver Colorado and San José California in the USA, at the World Textile Art event Textilmuseum in Neumünster Germany.

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

If I Wake

Photographer Andrea Cordonier recently launched a new exhibition entitled If I Wake at the Giardino Salon & Gallery in Carleton Place. The exhibition continues at 129 Bridge Street until November 17, during which time Cordonier invites guests to step inside to reflect on the value of going outside.

The solo show explores the critical role of nature in human creativity and well-being. Connection to nature is a quality of life issue often taken for granted, but it possesses benefits that are well-documented. According to biologist, naturalist, theorist and author E.O. Wilson, "nature holds the and even spiritual satisfaction."

Wilson popularized the idea of biophilia, what Greek philosopher Aristotle called "the love of life". Wilson makes the case that "...to explore and affiliate with [all species of] life is a deep and complicated process in mental development... our existence depends on this propensity, our spirit is woven from it, hope rises on its currents."

While biophilia may be an unfamiliar term for many, its effects are universally felt and admired; it's in the taste of a freshpicked apple, bird calls at dawn, the shade of a tree, the touch of a pet, the hand of a friend, sun on bare shoulders, and the scent everywhere, all of the time.

Cordonier is a client of Nick Giardino and a fan of small places, both for their histories and possibilities. She's a graduate of the Advanced Housing Program at Algonquin College, Perth and writes about the relationship of people to their homes and communities at <Habicurious.com>.

Italian-born and London-trained, Giardino is a master stylist who draws clients from as far away as Toronto. His downtown salon and gallery is a destination location and the kind of architectural wonder sought after in the city, but now mostly possible in the heritage towns, like Carleton Place, that ring Ottawa's urban limits. The salon is an impeccable balance of old and new, provoking awe, envy and the not-so-irrational desire to sell up and move here immediately. The space reflects Giardino's knowledge, expertise and taste for la dolce vita.

Cordonier sees small towns like Carleton key to our aesthetic, intellectual, cognitive Place or villages like Burritt's Rapids, where she lives, as more than dots on a map. At the nexus of architectural grace, affordability, flexibility and creativity, small — even micro — places can become cultural draws. Her choice of Giardino's salon for the installation of *If I Wake* directly feeds a particular interest: to find ways of using commercial (and public) spaces more creatively in order to co-promote economic and cultural development and quality of life in small centres.


Seeing Stars

From October 5 to November 11, Sivarulrasa Gallery in Almonte is pleased to present STARFIELDS, a solo exhibition of photographic works by artist Sanjeev Sivarulrasa. Curated by Almonte-based sculptor Deborah Arnold, the exhibition combines Sivarulrasa's deep sky images with new works from his recent travels in Algonquin Park.

Sanjeev Sivarulrasa is inspired by the night sky. He sees starry skies, far from city lights, as a meditative space for introspection and creativity. "You can see time in the sky," he says, "in the city we've stopped looking up at night, we've forgotten." Through his travels and his work, he hopes to recover an elusive

serenity, a reconnection with the natural world. As his fascination with the night sky grew, he left his background in law to pursue art as a professional artist, curator, and founder of Sivarulrasa Gallery in Almonte, Ontario. Indeed, what first brought him to Almonte was the light pollution by-law in the Town of Mississippi Mills, which has kept the night sky reasonably dark in the area.

His tools include portable telescopes, lenses, and CCD/digital cameras, and the techniques of long-exposure astrophotography. His extensive knowledge of astronomy and celestial mythology provides reference and support for his vision. Some of the works appear sculptural, almost three-dimensional, with compositions that appear to dance. When standing in front of the largest work, Vega (Triptych), a ten-

foot wide composition, one has the feeling of weightlessness, of falling into the work. "I liken my work to painting with light," he says. "Over the years, my imagery has moved toward abstraction and stillness, seeking out simplicity in solitary environments."

Nature in art has played a central theme in recent feature exhibitions at General Fine Craft in Almonte.






Drink Up! at the Almonte Potters Guild

Richard Gill Captures Ireland


It has often been said there is a wee bit of Irish in all of us — well most certainly those of us in the Ottawa Valley at the very least.





MMLT Fall Colours Hike on Blueberry Mountain

You'll have a rare opportunity to discover Saddle-back Trail at the Mississippi Madawaska Land Trust (MMLT) annual fall colours hike at Blueberry Mountain on Sunday, October 14. Saddleback Mountain is an apt description given by early settlers to the scenic ridge that begins at Blueberry Mountain and ends at Pike's Peak. These two outcroppings provide the highest outlooks in Lanark County, and both have a unique beauty all their own.

Compared with the number of visitors to Blueberry Mountain, relatively few have hiked the ridge to Pike's Peak. The reason is the absence of a marked trail between the two points. This results in a feeling of wildness and un-sanitized wilderness grandeur — a delight to the senses. A few have gotten lost — it is easy to do so — and therefore it is highly recommended that visitors are accompanied by a guide.

The ridge dips and ascends through different habits of natural red pine, oak, white pine, hemlocks and cedars. No more than a few minutes pass without beholding magnificent views, including a spot named Pulpit Rock that inspires thoughts of a wilderness

sermon in pictures. Many nature lovers have said that this hike is one of the most rewarding they have ever experienced.

For the first time, the Mississippi Madawaska Land Trust and cliffLAND are featuring this guided hike for their annual fall fundraising walk. Registration opens at 10AM and the hike begins at 10:30. Admission is \$10. For those wishing to go beyond Blueberry Mountain, the Saddleback Mountain ridge adds about an hour of walking time to the half-hour it takes to climb Blueberry Mountain. Bring your lunch and enjoy it on top of Pike's Peak. Don't forget your camera, because the views and the colours are spectacular!

Blueberry Mountain is located at 502 Hills of Peace Rd. near Flower Station in Lanark Highlands. Drive north of Lanark on Highway 511 to Brightside. Turn left on to the French Line Rd. Drive towards Flower Station and watch for the right turn when you get to Joe's Lake. Just before you reach Flower Station, turn right on to Hills of Peace Rd. 

Up to Me

An Autobiography by David A. S. Fraser

ography of Perth resident David A. S. Fraser. As an intimate and personal self-examination it has much to offer, and it would be a disservice to judge this book solely on its literary merit. It is an honest account of the ups and downs of an everyman now facing impaired mobility and the looming threat of obscurity as he approaches the last act of his life.

Fraser has led an interesting and challenging life. On the back cover of his handsomely bound, legibly printed (even those in his own age cohort can read it!), and photographically illustrated book, he has written: "How does one experience at least six major concussions without any of them being sports-related?", and "What's it like spending a total of two-and-a-half years' time over a period of twenty years in psychiatric wards across the province and coming out better for the experience?"

With a wry sense of humour and a sometimes disconcerting honesty, he recounts his life's ups and downs. He has been a teacher, served as a Board of Education Trustee, played Santa Claus for ten consecutive seasons, been a serial thespian, raised a family, been civilly divorced and ecstatically remarried, and has battled recurring episodes of mental illness throughout.

His biography is an invitation to experience his life vicariously. He is still doing it his way, and he faces the uncertainty that lies ahead with his lifelong conviction: it's "Up to Me."


In His Own Words

My experiences covered in the book focus mainly on that period from when the obstetrician slapped me on my backside and I sang my first C above high C (thus commencing

In other words, anyone who still has a sense of humour and wants to continue breathing and laughing for as long as they are able."

> David is particularly keen to bring mental health in general — and his own experiences in particular — into the spotlight. He explains that: "I spent a lot of my life going through some pretty rough times. Some of those times were pretty desperate and I surprised myself by surviving because I got the right help at the right time. There are a lot of us out there who may be going through what you might be experiencing, so don't be afraid to reach out to find someone who is willing to listen."

Mudds Youth Troupe Brings Shakespeare to Carleton Place

This October, eleven young local actors in the Mississippi Mudds Youth Theatre will perform William Shakespeare's *The Merchant of Venice* at the takes on another social challenge Carleton Place Town Hall Theatre. Director Mark Piper talks about the challenge of bringing a new production of this classic play to the stage.

In my nine years of bringing Shakespeare to the Carleton Place Town Hall, the young actors in the Mudds Youth Theatre have had to examine and present a lot of difficult issues onstage. In Macbeth, we looked at the occult, murder, and predestination versus free will. In *Hamlet*, it was the meaning of life. In *Othello*, the psychology of good and evil; in Romeo and Juliet, youth versus old age; and in King Lear, the corruption played by Julia Martin (who has brought about by power.


So we're no strangers to controversy. Still, I hesitated in picking *The Lear* and Feste in *Twelfth Night*). *Merchant of Venice* for our 2018 production. I wasn't sure we were ready to take on racism and antisemitism.

William Shakespeare, who probably never met anyone of the Jewish faith (Jewish people were expelled from England in the year 1290 by King Edward I and were not allowed back in until 1656 by Oliver Cromwell) wrote one of the fullest and most potent examinations of religious and racial intolerance — in particular, antisemitism — in 1596. And it is still a difficult and challenging play to perform.

When these teenage actors, raised in the 21st century, first came in contact with the text, they were all horrified by its treatment of Shylock. Shylock is called by his name only 17 times in the play: the other 58 times he is simply referred to as "the Jew". And they are extremely conflicted about the title character Antonio, the Merchant of Venice: is he a hero, or a villain, or something else?

Fortunately for me, the actors — Kaitlyn Rossigol, playing Shylock, and Emily Burns, playing Antonio — were more than up to the challenge. They present both of these extremely problematic roles with nuance and thoughtfulness, and their inner conflicts illuminate the problem of the play with crystal clarity.

Veteran Shakespearean Claire Campbell, who has played such diverse parts as Fabian in *Twelfth Night* and Goneril in *King Lear*, takes on the small but critical role of the Duke of Venice in the play. Her characterization of the difficulty faced by authority in the face of prejudice — and in granting a pound of flesh — heightens the tension of the critical courtroom scene, keeping the audience in doubt until the final moments of the trial.



Of course, Shakespeare also in the same play: sexism. Because, although it may seem strange to those who have never performed the play, neither Shylock nor Antonio have the largest role in the play. That is reserved for Portia, the maid of Belmont, previously played Cordelia in King Julia's portrayal of an intelligent young noblewoman bound by her late father's will to marry the first man that comes along to solve his silly riddle (should it be the Gold, the Silver, or the Lead?), and how

she both obeys it and subverts it at the same time, and then, in disguise, saves the day in the trial scene, shows Shakespeare's view of a woman that combines strength, compassion, and intelligence in a manner far superior to any of the men on the stage.

Of course, a play with this much drama needs some comic relief, and thank goodness veteran Emily Hogan, who played Viola in Twelfth Night and the Fool in *King Lear*, provides it in abundance with her spot-on renditions of Launcelot Gobbo's comic

So if you're willing to be challenged, or if you want to see how far ahead of his time Shakespeare actually was, come out and see our version of his difficult and controversial play. Or if you just want to see some fine classical acting, do join us this month.


Come Reminisce with Perth's Own John Richard



Queen Milli of Galt

Did England's Edward VIII Really Marry a Small-town Ontario Teacher?

There is a roadside graveyard near Galt, Ontario, part of what is now the municipality of Cambridge, on the Grand River near Waterloo. The cemetery is like hundreds of burial grounds in rural Ontario hushed, historic, fascinating. But this particular site holds a clue, literally etched in stone, to a hundredyear-old mystery.

Inscribed on the monument of Millicent Milroy, a guiet local schoolteacher who died in 1984, are the words "Millicent Milroy, daughter of James and Helen Jane Milroy, Wife of Edward (VIII), Duke of Windsor, 1894-1972."

Really? Is it possible that a rural Ontario schoolteacher was secretly married to one of the most controversial figures in British royal history? Or is Millicent Milroy's claim simply a mental mirage contrived by a lonely, or perhaps delusional, smalltown spinster? The dramatic facts of this incredible story are about to unfold, right here in Perth.

Queen Milli of Galt is a stage play by Canadian playwright Gary Kirkham that brings the compelling mystery of Millicent Milroy to light, potentially adding a romantic twist to Canadian history. It opens at the Perth Studio Theatre on Thursday, October 11.

Award-winning theatrical director Carolee Mason discovered the play while adjudicating a drama festival in Western Ontario. Captivated by Millicent's story, she decided to bring this remarkable romantic drama to Perth.

"It is a historic fact that the Prince of Wales, Edward VIII, visited Galt in 1919, and that Millicent Milroy met him during his royal tour. That's really where the evidence trail ends," says Carolee. "But for more than 60 years, Millicent, a sober, upstanding community figure, repeated her story with such cleareyed conviction that it can't simply be dismissed. Queen Milli of Galt imagines her romance with the dashing Edward, and how their relationship may have unfolded."

History tells us that Edward VIII hated the suffocating protocol that bound his every move while he was on tour. He was notorious for disappearing from his handlers without notice, taking solitary walks, ignoring formal events he was expected to attend. On this day, Edward's presence was required at the commemoration of a WWI memorial in Galt. Millicent Milroy, a very private woman who cared nothing for the monarchy (her sweetheart, a young Canadian soldier, had been killed in *their* war) was one of the few people who wasn't downtown waiting to see the prince. Ironically, because she and Edward had both stayed away from the ceremony, they ended up meeting, perhaps on the street, and their romance took shape.

Director Mason says there's a facet of Edward's character that lends credence to Milli's account.

"We all know that later in his life Edward abdicated to marry Wallis Simpson, whom he adored for her domineering manner and abrasive irreverence toward him," explains Carolee. "Like Wallis, Millicent Milroy was no gushing royal-watcher, and this would have appealed to Edward. You have to ask, why would Milli make up a fantasy romance with a celebrity she cared nothing about? She fell in love with the man before she even knew who he was."

A Guelph woman who was Millicent's friend said that Milli swore she would remain silent for the rest of her life. "They'll have to wait until I die," said Milli. "Then they'll know."





We have a full live band and singers, and since most plays do not need dance and movement we need to have a choreographer. A Murder is Announced

Agatha Christie at the Station Theatre

Many great mysteries excel at keeping people wondering "who done it?", and in A Murder is Announced you will be pondering that question up until the very last minutes! Written by Leslie Darbon and based on a classic work by the master of mystery, Ms Christie, this play will give you reason to consider every character capable of the dirty deed — except, perhaps, Miss Marple.

Director Katharine Coleman has an affinity for murder mysteries. They are what she reads in her down-time, and she finds that putting them on as plays is entertaining as well as challenging. She's created a following of patrons who wait patiently for the next mystery to come along, and she works hard to make sure that they are entertained. The best way to do that, she feels, is to start with a strong cast who can create defined characters capable of subtlety. There are so many clues that come out in what might seem like throw-away lines, but you have to listen closely and really pay attention to figure them out. And even then, she's pretty confident that you won't have guessed correctly! "There are so many red herrings in this story that although it makes perfect sense that one character might have done it... they didn't," she explains. "That's what keeps it exciting!"

The story is as follows: an announcement is made in the local paper that a murder is to take place at the home of Miss Letty Blacklock (Donna Howard) on that very day, Friday the 13th. Everyone assumes it's a joke, and although there is a bit of apprehension leading up to the scheduled time of 6:30, it's not taken too seriously... until the stranger, A Swiss Nationalist (Bernie O'Hara), shows up with a gun. The lights go out, and the "bad guy" ends up dead. From there forward, motives for all sorts of things and long-held secrets come out of the woodwork to confuse the audience, the characters, and sometimes the actors, to tell you the truth.

Also living with Miss Blacklock are her long-time companion Miss Bunner (Heddy Sorour), who is becoming forgetful with her history, Blacklock's niece and nephew Julia (Katharine Coleman) and Patrick (Rich Croteau) Simmons, as well as Phillipa Haymes (Wendy Monagle), a young lodger with secrets of her own. 



Insider Information on Ugly Apples

"Ugly Apple". Readers of this column likely know the tale of the Ugly Duckling but are coming late to the party — the Ugly Apple has already been transformed into ciders that have won international acclaim.

So, what exactly is cider and why does it merit attention? The formal definition of cider distinguishes fermented (hard) from unfermented (sweet) products but it fails to distinguish between fermented products that are dry versus sweet. Generally it specifies that the fruit be apples. Cider apples differ from "eating apples", and the alcohol content of traditional ciders ranges from 3.5% to over 10%. In France only apples are allowed, while in the UK cider must contain at least 35% apple juice. Perry is a cider-like beverage made from — you guessed it! — pears.

Weetabix notes that even the sweetest apples do not contain more than 10% sugar, and that on a weight basis, sugar yields about half its weight in alcohol. By the way — yeasts vary in their tolerance for alcohol but some strains can still carry on fermentation at high concentrations (while most brewers' yeasts are temperate and stop working around 5% alcohol levels). All of which leads to the conclusion that a fair amount of "messing about" may have taken place between the apple and the bottle. Indeed, most of what is sold through the LCBO as "cider" is a crowd-pleasing refreshment that has been engineered, sugared and made fizzy, and put in cans for consumer convenience. Nothing fundamentally wrong with that, and Weetabix supports engineering and good quality control. However, these products are not traditional cider. For that, one needs to go back to reference products such as are available in rural England, France or Spain. Or one can save on airfare and go to the Perth Farmers' Market... but read on.

In North America, where early European settlers of cider. Found it too! Not just any cider but cultivated apples widely, ciders were an early and specifically ciders sold under the brand name very popular beverage. Prohibition damaged cider production more than beer — partly because of the slow recovery of apple trees — but recent years have seen rapid growth of cider as a beverage class. Alas, "real" cider apple varieties lack a separate fruit market and therefore the growers concentrated on varieties with higher yields and popular flavours. A few orchards went wild, and artisanal producers have revived "real" cider varieties from the descendants of these remnants.

> Apples are polyploidy and do not breed true from seed; new varieties are easily created by crossbreeding but the genetics are complex. Creation of new varieties is significantly a matter of chance and selection. However, once a desired result is obtained it can be multiplied by grafting, since fortuitously apple trees take grafts readily and a single tree can be effectively multiplied for production. The small number of varieties of apples available in grocery stores is a reflection of the economics of mass marketing, shipping and herd behaviour. Preservation of distinctive flavourful varieties like russets requires that you (yes you personally) attend to them and purchase them at a premium price to incent growers. The same is true for cider apples which are generally not pretty and lack immediate mouth appeal — but you don't eat hops either, do you? Cider apples are essential to making traditional cider and so we loop back to the main topic. Traditional ciders are not sweet and they are not fizzy. They are not "fruit beer" (although some can be mixed with beer with pleasant and interesting results). They are not the base of cocktails and they are not the subject of endless debates about obscure flavour notes or snobby rituals. Weetabix will not whine about ciders.

> True ciders are a robust beverage carrying the signature of terroir and a long tradition of peasant farming practices. They are as unique as their makers and locale and can be consumed alone or with food or in food. And so to the incongruously named "Ugly

Apple" — a micro (perhaps better termed nano) producer of two varieties of traditional cider and another product which is designated "apple wine". No cheating though, since it is sweetened with honey and fermented to dryness; apple wines and fruit wines may be the topic of a future article but here we are staying with cider. The Ugly Apple label goes on an artisanal product that is the result of a long love affair with cider and the fortuitous presence of old orchards on the Fisher-Cote farmstead in Lanark County.

Cider Making at Fisher-Cote is a family affair. Bret, Amy and their son Ethan are all involved in the enterprise that started as Bret's passionate hobby and has grown into a small farm-based business. In a world where production of 10,000 liters is considered to be small, Ugly Apple produces about




