



The festive fun continues in Pakenham with the annual Santa Claus Parade at 1PM on Saturday, December 6. It will wind through the charming village streets twice to ensure no one misses the magic.

The parade leaves the Stewart Community Centre (112 MacFarlane Street) at 1PM sharp and will travel to Jeanie Street (toward the fire station), then turn right onto County Road 29, and make another right and the community centre.

The Magic Realism of Toller Cranston

on Toller's amazing, fiercely original "Magic Realism" art. This is the second time his older sister (and Arnprior resident) Phillippa Cranston Baran is committed to ensuring that "Canadians remember Toller as a creative genius, who worked like a demon, chased his destiny without fear, and continues to inspire others to dream big."

On January 25, Phillippa is celebrating her brother's fantastic art with the launch of her beautiful coffee table art book tribute. Titled *Toller Cranston: Artistic Impressions*, it "explores a stunning body of work through the perspectives of the artist who created the work, the gallerists who represented the work,

the collectors who fell in love with the work, and the sister who bought for \$15 the first piece he ever sold — a pen and ink drawing of a dead chicken that he did at age fifteen."

Her new book does more than that. It gladdens the heart. Phillippa succeeds in her mission. Her book makes us even happier and prouder than we already are to be Canadian. Most of us remember Toller primarily as an outrageously talented and irrepressible world figure skating champion. In addition to being six-time Canadian champion and 1976 Olympic bronze medalist, he singlefootedly* revolutionized men's skating. He coached, choreographed, designed costumes, conceived and produced and starred in ice shows and television spectaculars.

Many of us, however, are not as aware of his extraordinary life and accomplishments as an artist. Phillippa's gorgeous presentation of Toller's paintings is interspersed with his quotes, and this one seems particularly



He always painted, and he brought the same discipline, work ethic, conviction and creativity to his art that brought him fame as a skater. Long before he retired from his varied skating activities, his paintings were showing up in homes and galleries around the world.

He painted like he skated — flamboyantly, brilliantly, unrestrainedly; the canvases are instantly recognizable as Toller's. He wrote, "As an artist, I don't question images or themes. It is an extraordinarily researched and heart-warming compendium of tributes and factual data, citing over 150 contributors and sources celebrating the life and unique gifts of her brother – "a creative genius." > Toller authored four books, and they provoked a wide range of responses from critics. One wrote that Toller's "... incisive, literate, shriek-aloud funny autobiographies present the artist far better than any tribute could." My perusal found that they also reveal the wild demands and consequences of his creativity and perfectionism, the insecurities that plagued him, and his self-imposed emotional isolation. He deserves much better, and his talented sister has risen to the challenge with her two books celebrating her brother's hard-won and fully deserved stature as a Canadian icon.

She hopes that by getting to know the artist as a person, becoming more familiar with the influences and experiences that impacted his work, and gaining a better understanding of his thinking and attitudes, readers will have a richer, deeper, more complete experience with his artworks. Youth Centre Benefit Concert at CP Gallery

A benefit concert at the Carleton Place Gallery featuring The Nathan Sloniowski Trio will be raising much needed funds for the Carleton Place Youth Centre. Nathan (guitar and vocals), Bill Serson (drums) and Barry Buse (bass and vocals) will be performing songs from Nathan's acclaimed solo album *The Lost Love Letter to a Small Town*.

Nathan also plays with The Ragged Flowers and The Maywoods, so he may sneak in a couple of tunes he contributes to those bands. Tickets for the 7PM show on Saturday, December 6 are available at <TicketsPlease.ca> or at the gallery, and all funds raised from tickets and performancenight edibles prepared by youth centre volunteers will go directly to the centre.

"I approached Ginny Fobert, the owner and human cultural sparkplug at the Carleton Place Gallery, about doing a Christmas benefit," explains Nathan. "I'd played there earlier this year with The Ragged Flowers, and it's a magical place for a show among the paintings and sculptures. Ginny was instantly supportive, and suggested that the band direct funds from our concert to the Carleton Place Youth Centre, which her research showed is often overlooked by local fundraisers."

Ginny set up a meeting for Nathan to meet with Sharon Ruth, the Executive Director of the Carleton Place Youth Centre, and Nathan was "blown away by the programming there," with after-school dropins on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays; evening crafts and cooking programs; summer camps and special outings throughout the year for 8- to 15-yearold children. The gallery is also supporting Three-Fifty Squares, a special holiday exhibition featuring a diverse selection of original 12x12 artworks and sculptures all priced at \$350, with 10% of all proceeds being donated to the Youth Centre.

Nathan's original compositions blend the groove of Jesse Winchester with the down-to-earth wit and wisdom of John Prine. In his latest album, *The Lost* Love Letter to a Small Town, Nathan spins artfully crafted tales of neighbourly kindness, hopeless romanticism, community rivalries, guitar obsession, world we create at home.

Carleton Place's Barry Buse and Arnprior's Bill Serson make up the band's rhythm section. "Barry and Bill helped me launch the album at a sold-out Folkus concert series show in 2024, and we played another sold-out show to kick off last fall's Music at MERA Series in McDonald's Corners," says Nathan. "They're incredible musicians."

Barry's a road-tested bassist who's played with gospel and blues legend Diunna Greenleaf, and toured North America and Australia with stops at major festivals from Ottawa BluesFest to the Tremblant International Blues Festival with Trevor Finlay. Bill teaches percussion at Arnprior's Main Street School of Music, and his students have gone on to study music at the university level and then launch amazing careers. He is a two-time Canadian Snare Drum Champion whose musical mastery is influenced by legends like Buddy Rich and Steve Gadd.

The Father of the **Christmas Bird Count**

"To the bird lover, a world without birds is a dead world; a mere shell of a world."

- Frank M. Chapman, 1864-1945

Frank Michler Chapman was born on June 12, 1864, in Englewood, New Jersey. His father was an attorney for an important bank on Wall Street. His mother was a gardener, piano player and artist. Although he had no musical talent, Chapman always maintained that his mother's love of music made him "deeply responsive to the songs of birds." His lifelong love affair with birds started at eight years old, when he encountered a bright red cardinal.

After graduating from Englewood Academy, Chapman started working at a New York bank to follow in his father's footsteps. However, his true passion was nature and birds, but he didn't know how to earn a living from it.

A fortuitous meeting on a commuter train with passion and longing for a different life. An article published in January 1884 was a stepping stone: the American Ornithologists Union needed volunteers to work on a nationwide bird migration study. Chapman winner. applied and was accepted into the program.

While working at the bank six days a week, he devoted every spare moment to the bird migration study. Ultimately, the call of the wild was too strong, and at 25 Chapman left his banking job and became a freelance naturalist.

In 1888 he became assistant to Dr. Joel Allen, bird curator at the American Museum of Natural History. Chapman's dedication allowed him to become head of the museum's new Department of Ornithology

Throughout his 54-year career at the museum, Chapman demonstrated his brilliant skills as an administrator and writer. He roamed the earth to explore and research the world of birds in their most secluded retreats.

Chapman's contribution to bird research is doubtless invaluable. However, he lived in an uninformed time period, where the common tool used to learn about birds was the shotgun. It is difficult to understand and accept that this lover of birds joined his populations across North America. counterparts in the slaying of birds.

> In 1900, Chapman took it upon himself to put a stop to the carnage by suggesting a much better and beneficial option: counting birds instead of killing them. He wrote in *Bird-Lore*: "a new kind of Christmas side hunt, in the form of a Christmas bird census... we hope that all our readers who have the opportunity will spend a portion of Christmas Day with the birds."

As an ornithologist, researcher, explorer, naturalist and writer, Frank Chapman has innumerable accomplishments to his credit; and yet, 80 years after his death, he is still remembered primarily as the Father of the Christmas Bird Count.

A New Chapter for Jeff Banks of JB Arts

For the past fifteen years, JB Arts has been a creative anchor in Almonte — a place where kids and adults alike have learned to "dress for a mess," embrace mistakes, and discover their Jeff Banks prepares to close the business and sell the building on Mill Street, I sat down with him to talk about how it all started, the community, and what he hopes people will remember.

theHumm: When you think back to your early days in Almonte, what stands out most clearly?

Jeff Banks: One of the biggest draws, honestly, was Noreen Young and the puppet festival. I actually owned her puppet DVD before we moved here. When I heard there was a puppet festival in town, that really pulled me in.

Not long after, someone on the street said: "Have you talked to Noreen yet?" I said no, and they pointed across to Baker Bob's and said, "She's right there." So I just walked over and introduced myself. That was a pretty great way to start off in a new town.



Did you have a specific model in mind when you opened?

Before Almonte, I ran an art school in Oakville just first — kids only. Then I realized adults really wanted to take classes too, so I expanded. At first we primarily taught painting. Then people started asking for more, so I added more. I started small and let demand build. My first summer camp here had six kids. This past summer, we had around 48 kids a day — over 400 hits hard. unique kids came through.

And that's just camps. With all the school bookings in the area, we calculated that we reached about 1,700 kids last spring alone. Creatively, this town has been fantastic. It just takes time and consistency to

When did JB Arts stop being just you and become more of a team effort?

For years I never thought of myself as an artist — I described myself as an "edutainer". There came a point where JB Arts got so busy that I had to choose between focusing on management or accepting that own artistic voices. As owner and founder I am an artist and my teaching is the art. I had the realization that as an artist I needed a manager so that I could focus what I love most — teaching art.

One of the best decisions I made was hiring Jessica special relationship JB Arts has had with the Plager. I originally brought her on so I could repaint the basement. It turned out to be cheaper to hire someone to help me organize classes than to hire a painter.

> She filled my classes so guickly that the basement painting didn't get done for years. Then when I opened the lower level, I could teach pottery downstairs while others taught drawing and painting upstairs.

Since then, we've had many people be part of the team over the years. There have been so many wonderful teachers, and I am grateful to them for sharing their talents and enthusiasm with our students. I do want to give a special shout-out to staff member Roz Weisberg, who's been with us for something like twelve years. I couldn't have done it without all those folks.

What influence do you think JB Arts has had on young people and their artistic journeys?

I think the biggest thing is giving kids permission to get messy. As soon as they're allowed to get clay up to their elbows or pastel all over their faces, they really engage. "Dress for a mess" has been our motto for years. Once kids are allowed to get messy, they stop worrying so much about being perfect. They need places where it's okay to try, fail, and try again.

You have offered courses in a wide variety of media. Why is that important to you?

Because everybody has an artistic passion, even if they don't realize it. It might be painting cars, decorating cakes, doing nails, building sets, making puppets, throwing pots — these are all artistic outlets.

That's why JB Arts offers so many things. If the pottery wheel isn't your thing, maybe you'll love hand-building or sculpture. If clay isn't it, maybe glass will grab you. The key is to help people find what clicks for them.

In your recent letter to the community, you said that JB Arts has become more than a small business. What did you mean by that?

What I wanted to say is that JB Arts is really a community space. It doesn't matter who you are or what your skill level is — if you want to come in, for kids. When I opened here, I did the same thing at have fun, and you've got even a tiny bit of ambition, you're welcome.

> Recently an older British couple who had just moved here told me they felt like they'd finally found their place in town at JB Arts — and then two weeks later they heard I was closing. That kind of thing

Your letter also said you'll be doing art and teaching in some capacity forever.

Absolutely. If I won the lottery, I'd probably repaint the bathroom — but I wouldn't change what I do.

The real question is how to keep doing it without working 24/7. Camps, classes, managing a building — that's a lot. I need to separate the business side from my personal life and figure out a better balance.

But I can't see myself doing anything else and being happy. Teaching art — helping people discover what they can do — that's the part I love. The building was just the vehicle. I can always find another vehicle.

What do you most hope students will remember about JB Arts? I hope they remember that it's okay to make mistakes.

I often tell my students that they're here to have fun, to try something new, to learn the technique by playing with it and messing it up a few times, and then, yes, to go home with a piece of art they're proud of. With older students I add that the first job is just to try it and accept that it won't be perfect, the second is to like it themselves, and only after that should they worry about whether anyone else likes it.

For instance, once a student made this beautiful bowl, then accidentally cut a big chunk out of the rim and was devastated. I sculpted a tiny cat and put it on the rim so it looked like the cat had knocked that chunk out and then fallen asleep there. She loved it. The bowl sold right away, and later she started doing that intentionally on other pieces.

So often the "mistake" isn't the problem. The problem is a lack of imagination about how to fix it.

As JB Arts moves into its next chapter, Jeff is clear on two points: he loves Almonte, and he hopes to stay.

"I call it my town," he says. "If I can stay, I will. Mostly I just want to say thank you. So many friendships and creative journeys started in that space. If you liked art, that was the only prerequisite."

Whether JB Arts returns in a new form or Jeff finds another way to keep teaching, his influence will live on in every kid who learned to love the mess, every adult who dared to pick up a brush again, and every so-called mistake that turned into something unexpectedly beautiful.

if they had just stumbled in from a blustery snowstorm. When folks are thinking about finding a special gift that will be make their loved ones happy, their default is cheerful. They look lit from within by joy. And that joy is contagious. It's a truly lovely thing.

Now, I'd say half those people knew exactly what they wanted to gift their loved ones. Roughly half, though, had only a vague idea, and they were never shy about asking

"My wife wants a good cookbook," a gentleman would tell me. "Trendy or classic?" I'd ask. "Definitely classic."

I'd lead him to Mastering the Art of French Cooking by Julia Child, Louisette Berthole and Simone Beck.

It is for people like this that I enjoy recommending books for the holidays — books I've enjoyed this year, books other writers can't stop raving about, books with glowing reviews, books readers and critics alike seem rectly from its publisher, Palimpsest Press to have thoroughly enjoyed, and even a few books not too many people are talking about (yet). So, here we go.

My top, absolutely no-doubt, five-star recommendation is *In the Field*, a superb collection of essays written by Kingston's Poet Laureate Sadiga de Meijer. De Meijer

been touring *In the Field* at festivals and a remarkable one — from his teenage years, middle part of the book takes place decades bookshops across Ontario, and the one word I keep hearing to describe the book (from booksellers, writers, and audiences alike) is "brilliant." And that it is.

In *The New Quarterly*, Pamela Mulloy cheeked and happy. It didn't matter observed that de Meijer's essay *After Etty* is, as an act of curiosity and homage, "a philosophical pilgrimage." It's true that all nine essays in this collection are philosophical in nature. They are also gorgeously, poetically written, insightfully and intimately observed, compelling, and at times playful. Whatever the subject — losing a notebook; an enlightening, exhausting stint in medical school; a spiritual journey retracing the steps of a Dutch Jewish writer and Holocaust diarist de Meijer's inquisitiveness and sharp mind shine; throughout this exceptional collection she writes with warmth and skill, and we're gifted views of the world through her keen eyes and empathetic voice. These are worldclass essays by a writer with extraordinary powers. I found *After Etty* — de Meijer's heartfelt essay about Esther Hillesum — so deeply powerful and moving, I immediately started looking for Hillesum's diary and letters. Thankfully, they remain with us in Hillesum's book: *An Interrupted Life and* Letters from Westerbork.

Next up, I heartily recommend two — who won the 2021 Governor General's fascinating memoirs by acclaimed writers: Literary Award for Non-fiction for her Cameron Crowe's *The Uncool* and Susan as a campus novel that hooks you from the reading, and happy holidays, everyone!

through to his career as a beloved Hollywood writerdirector — and he very charmingly chronicles all that (and a lot more) in *The Uncool*. In a quirky, charming way, Crowe's writing is masterful storytelling and — precisely because he's not trying to be, I think — singularly

Susan Orlean's story is not unlike Cameron Crowe's. Both got some lucky breaks along the way, and both worked very, very hard at something they loved and dearly wanted

to do. They followed their creative callings, and at an early age they each found exhilarating success. *Joyride* gives us an intimate look at Orlean's fortunate and sometimes tumultuous personal life and her storied career as an ambitious, unflinching, and masterful journalist. This memoir would be the perfect gift for the aspiring writer in your life. Like her previous best-selling books — *The Orchid Thief* among them this one is filled with joy, fascinating people, and unforgettable stories as well.

Both collections shimmer with insight and truth about the beauty, sorrow, and contradictions of the human experience.

Our congratulations, too, to local author Alyssa Delle Palme, as her 2023 novel Summer at Pine Lake has been named a finalist for the 2025 Canadian Book Club Awards, one of the country's largest readers' choice awards.

Craft Cycle — **Creative ReUse**

New Organization Offers Workshops and Diverts Craft Supplies from Landfill

Everyone seems to have craft supplies collecting in a drawer, box, closet or even a craft room. For many people, these items have been left underutilized, unused or forgotten. Often during a clean-out, half-used materials are disposed of when they are no longer seen as useful. Most of these products can't be curbside recycled, and small quantities do not sell in online marketplaces. That's where Craft Cycle — Creative ReUse becomes part of the equation. Committed to reducing waste by consolidating and repurposing creative materials, they offer opportunities for individuals and businesses to donate usable items that might otherwise end up in landfill. By sourcing donations of diverse materials — from leftover fabric and yarn to scrap paper, paint, tools and other supplies they aim to establish a circular ecosystem of creativity that benefits both the environment and creative locals.

Craft Cycle was envisioned from a simple merging of households. Realizing that the mother-daughter team had more crafting a solution was needed. Inspired by creative reuse locations they had been to in the past, an idea was formed. What if they could put these items back into the hands of crafters at a reasonable price? They could consolidate and donate needed supplies to organizations, run workshops for an accessible fee, and have a community maker space that allows everyone to stop by and work on their own projects. With those ideas in mind, Craft Cycle was formed as a not-for-profit organization that is currently serving Carleton Place and surrounding areas.

To fuel the circular nature of Craft Cycle, they are soliciting donations of new or gently used crafting tools and supplies. A Bunch of Whimsy in Carleton Place has provided a donation drop-off location, and is spreading the word to their makers and customers. They have established a relationship with Cheerful Giver, who works with them to

divert excess crafting items that aren't curmaterials than they could possibly ever use, rently in need. Redistribution of donations has begun with an important connection to Art for Aid, who sends art supplies to remote Indigenous communities. Connecting with the community has been key to their forward momentum, and they plan to continue maintaining and strengthening these relationships.

Craft Cycle is currently exploring grant applications to support opening a physical space where crafters can donate items, explore supplies, and create projects. They want the centre to be a hub where environmental responsibility meets artistic expression, and where the community can come together to learn, create, and share in the joy of making new things from old materials. The last step is a \$300,000 local fundraising campaign.

Some of their properties are open to the public to enjoy the trails and nature, while others are reserved for research and educational purposes. As 2025 draws to a close, President Steve Kotze shares his thoughts with MMLT friends, members, and potential supporters.

Dear friend of MMLT,

As we approach the end of 2025, I wanted to celebrate all that we have achieved this year with your support. The act of acquiring properties for conservation is an inspiring positive action, leaving a legacy far beyond our own lifetimes, and it is key in mitigating the effects of climate change.

We protected over 800 acres of ecologically valuable wilderness across four new properties, including two that were purchased after our community responded so generously to our spring/ summer appeal.

Our 16 properties now span over 4,000 acres, and those open to the public welcome thousands of visitors each year. The lands we protect provide carbon storage equivalent to the emissions of 850 cars every year.

We held 13 outreach events including seasonal nature walks, a family festival, concerts, and an art workshop. These events bring our community together and showcase the natural beauty of our properties.

We expanded our team, adding a third full-time staff person and four new members to our Board of

Growing Gardens, Growing Community

The 2025 gardening season presented many challenges, not least munity as neighbours help one another. There are if you keep your eyes open, keep your heart teachable of which were drought and an early frost. Was the glass half-full? Being an incurable optimist, I'm remembering the successes and planning for greater success next year.

I have been reflecting on the role of gardening in my life. In many ways it has always been a constant, helping me through periods of major illness, relationship upheavals, and the everyday stresses of family and career. Putting my hands in the soil, planting and nurturing a seed or a young plant, engaging the senses of touch, smell and vision have always put me "in the moment."

While recent scientific research has demonstrated that plants respond to the human voice and can communicate in many ways, I suspect that the interaction has much stronger benefits for the human participant. Getting our hands in the soil and nurturing plants has tremendous benefits.

At our peril we ignore our "animal" side and our deep connection to the earth. A half-hour in the garden takes me away from the craziness in my mind and brings me clarity, objectivity, and a sense of peace and

Not surprisingly, these benefits of gardening have been observed by others. The Canadian Horticultural Therapy Association defines horticultural therapy as a formal practice that uses plants, horticultural activities, and the garden landscape to promote wellbeing for participants. It has proven beneficial in a wide variety of healthcare, residential, school and rehabilitative settings. Care of hospitalized war veterans after World War II greatly expanded the use of gardening and horticultural activities in structured, rehabilitative programs. It is now a discipline taught and practiced throughout the world.

Now we have even more justification for an obsessive pursuit of our favourite hobby!

While a solitary pursuit of gardening has salutary benefits, gardening collaboratively can multiply those benefits. Humans (even gardeners) are social beings and often join with like-minded individuals to share their passion and do good works together.

Community gardens are, of course, a great spot to grow a few tomatoes, but I feel that there is a whole lot more going on, such as an awesome sense of satisfaction in seeing the excitement as a new gardener you have been mentoring reaps their first harvest. A collection of garden plots in close proximity is a great catalyst for the development of com-

many gardeners who need a challenge. Some like to research, seek out expert advice, and experiment with new techniques. Satisfaction may be found in the journey rather than being bound up with a successful result! For many, their labour is part of a larger sense of purpose as they work towards a social goal such as educating youngsters, encouraging pollinators, or growing food for the food bank.

But how to get a start? The knowledge required can seem daunting. It seems to me that transferring knowledge about growing food from one generation to another is just not happening in our modern society. This has been brought home to me when dealing with student volunteers. It is not possible to assume even a minimum of knowledge. When I ask a volunteer to weed a row of peppers, I can't assume that the difference between a pepper plant and lamb's quarters is obvious to them. My eye can easily pick out just-germinated carrot seedlings in a bed covered with weeds; to a new gardener those seedlings are completely lost in a sea of weeds. This was expressed beautifully in a column a few years ago by Ottawa Citizen columnist Steve Maxwell: "I've never seen anyone learn to be a great gardener quickly. In my experience, getting good with soil, plants and sunshine is something that takes decades. That said, you can shave years off your learning curve

and your mind alert to worthwhile ideas."

While you can learn a lot from books and the internet, in my experience you can't beat real-time, real-life, hands-on learning. My advice is to get out and meet gardeners, folks with decades of experience who are delighted to share their knowledge. If possible, work side by side with them.


What better place to meet helpful gardeners than our Lanark County Horticultural (Hort) Societies? These are groups of enthusiastic gardeners that in their own quiet ways make our communities come alive. "Hort" members can be seen planting tulip bulbs at the Cenotaph in Almonte, adding some plants at the Victoria School Museum Garden in Carleton Place, taking care of gardens at several historic properties in downtown Perth, planting flowers at the Legion and Library gardens in Smiths Falls, and planting flowers at the Five-Span Bridge in Pakenham.

Where would you find a local Society? What is amazing to me is the number of them that are within easy driving distance. Within a fifteen-minute drive from the Almonte Old Town Hall there are four societies to be found; an additional ten lie within 45 minutes. Society membership often brings other perks, such as discounts at local garden centre. Many work closely with municipal authorities to beautify our towns. Exploring the Photographic Arts

I am fortunate to live in downtown Almonte where it often takes me the camera to express what you have experienced. fifteen to twenty minutes to walk from my condo to the post office and back. A Gift Goes Home

My father was proud of his Ontario roots. Sound and how his father left home with seventeen dollars to go to B.C., only returning to Ontario to claim his bride. Ontario was day. We loved the Village, seeing the woodworker, riding the canal boat, and especially the woollen mill. It was a noisy place: clanging looms, water rushing, and the constant hum of activity. The aroma of lanolin hung in the air as the wool was spun and finally put on the giant loom, creamy white and royal blue yarn ready to be woven into thick blankets.

During a day's visit we returned several times to see the progress of the weaving. It first looked like a scarf, then a lap robe, and then finally a full-sized blanket. It looked stiff and scratchy, and I couldn't imagine it I knew it was monetarily worth a lot more than the being at all comfortable sleeping with that next to the skin. The weaver assured me it wasn't finished yet and proceeded to run it through rollers padded with dried teasel heads that fluffed the blanket to a soft finish fit for a king.

get enough of that blanket. The miller told me the blanket would go up for sale, and by then I was obsessed! Before anyone else had a chance to claim it, I had the weaver sew on its label, and followed it to the shop, where we proudly took possession of the very one we'd watched all day. That being about 1976 or so, I can't imagine we paid more than \$200 for it. I've long ago lost the bill. It seemed like a lot at the time, but what a treasure we had!

For years that blanket was our bedspread, a warm He'd tell us stories of his family in Owen and welcoming reminder of the Village, a connection to ancestors, and a craft worth celebrating. Even in the summer the blanket was folded at the foot of the bed.

But times changed and we moved. New décor far away when we were kids, and never did I meant that quilts and blankets were relegated to think we'd actually get to Owen Sound one storage boxes. Occasionally I'd take them all out and air them on the clothesline, and vow to use them. They'd sit on a shelf for a week or two, before I'd reluctantly return them to the storage boxes. We thought our kids might want them, but they have their own style and it certainly isn't antique quilts or blankets. It seemed the Village blanket would remain an antique — preciously preserved, but not used as it should have been.


You might recall that I'm pretty good at tossing things. I give most things about five years to rest unused, and after that their days are numbered: clothing, books, china and linens live in fear of the black plastic bags. However, the blanket and quilts were secure in the knowledge they were safe. Still, I felt the blanket deserved better. I couldn't sell it, I couldn't give it away, so what to do?

In a moment of curiosity, I wrote to the curator at Upper Canada Village, laying out my plight and wondering if by any chance our blanket could be returned. I didn't want any sort of payment or even recognition, just the knowledge that it was back where it belonged. amount we'd paid, but money isn't everything. Peace of mind counts for a lot. To my great relief, he replied that even though they never take donations of items, this one they would gladly accept.

So we packed our lovely blanket, and off we went to Our afternoon was winding down, but I couldn't take it home. A group from the curator's office who'd been on the committee to accept it was there to meet us as we lovingly turned it over to their care. I felt like I was leaving a family heirloom, and I guess we really were. Come summer, we will go to the Village to see it again on public display at the mill where it will be enjoyed by visitors from far and wide. We'll be happy that we are leaving this legacy to the Village — and in some respects to our own ancestry, whose

MMLT Secures More Wilderness in the Madawaska Highlands



He's Getting Done What He Wants to Do

he bought coffee for the two of us at The Lighthouse Café and we began to talk.

I already knew that Jim Ferrier's family was the seventh generation on his Scotch Line Farm; if his grandchildren carry on, they will be the ninth.

The farm isn't large by today's thinking — 300 acres total. It's hard to know, he says, "if anyone past this generation will actually farm because — in the grand scheme — that's not really enough to support a family."

his family farm might possibly become part of a screwin, "are getting harder to do, but basically I still bigger operation."

Jim's married, has been for 44 years. He has three children, he comes from a line of long-lifers, says "longevity is good" with a grin, adding that "this life" as it can be. Looking back, he remembers a few other indications of what was to come: he lost his sense of smell in about 2014 — "that's often seen as an early sign," he says, adding "I've always had some degree of tremor," but was told it might be essential tremor brought on by exercise. Jim is a runner.

He remembers very clearly, though, that even in his 40s when he was the first one at the hockey arena, he and boxing movements, so he decided to give it a try. had trembles and trouble fitting the key into the lock.

There were a few other "neurological episodes," but He seemed a bit reticent when we first sat down, but nothing showed up... "and this is going back 30 years."

> That long ago? "I think so. I think the physiology was starting then."

> Thinking even further back, he remembers there was always some degree of tremor. "It was kind of destined," he adds. "My mom was diagnosed with Parkinson's."

> Still, when his doctor told him, he wasn't convinced. "But the first day he saw me, he asked me to walk and diagnosed me immediately."

Today, three years in, how does this affect him? But, musing a bit, he suggests the possibility that He admits that fine motor activities, like putting a do everything I want to do."

And that's a lot.

Jim thinks positively about making his life as good lots of time with them. "I want to do all I can for my

He has a strong faith in Jesus Christ. "I believe He's who He said He was — and to me that gives me a whole different perspective. "This life is just a small part of what's to come — and it's only going to get better. I believe that."

Jim also boxes with the Boxing Ties group in Smiths Falls, having seen a poster in his neurologist's office. A gerontologist friend told him there's a link between slowing the progression of the disease

He still runs — has done so since high school at PDCI — he ran the Glen Tay Block Race when he was

50, and then again at 60, and decided to do it a few more times before he turns 70. He's 68 now.

And now, coming up to the end of his seventh decade and having to navigate the ongoing work of Parkinson's, I ask him what's he learned.

He grins. He's not sure he's learned it yet... but it's happening —

Jim worked as a veterinarian for 15 years, farmed for 15 years, worked for the Canadian Food Inspection Agency for 15 years, retired in 2020, and now has time to reflect.

Each third of that time gave him a different perspective, he says. "I learned a lot everywhere. I have no regrets," he says, and admits that he does try to pass his learning on here and there.

As for patience?

"I like to think I got a lot better."

He adds, with a quick laugh, "I'd never say I've achieved 100 percent patience... but I think there have been big gains."

Good Food Co Hummus

⅓ cup garlic cloves, peeled

1¼ teaspoons salt

4 x 398 mL cans chickpeas, drained + rinsed

¼ cup olive oil

½ cup lemon juice

2 teaspoons ground cumin

½ cup tahini paste

½ cup parsley, washed + chopped fine

Process garlic with salt in food processor or blender;

Add remaining ingredients and process until smooth — drizzle in more olive oil if thinner consistency desired;

Adjust salt as necessary;

Store in sealed container in fridge for up to 1 week.
